I know all men by these presents that
 The Santa Anna Water Company, an incor-
 poration under the Laws of the State of California, incor-
 porated on the 10th day of January A.D. 1870, claim
 all the water flowing in the San Buena Bu-
 tura River, opposite to and immediately above
 the head of their ditch known as the lower
 ditch, where a copy of the Certificate is duly
 posted according to law, to the extent of
 five hundred acres for the purpose of
 irrigating lands along the bank of said
 ditch, and of supplying the town of San
 Buena Ventura with fresh water, and also
 for the purpose of manufacturing and
 water power and that it is the intention
 of said Company to divert the water of
 said River from its natural bed or chan-
 nel, to the lands aforesaid and to the town
 of San Buena Ventura by means of ditches
 canals flumes aqueducts reservoirs and
 pipes.

Notice is hereby given, that the undersigned
claims the water flowing in the San Juan
Culua River, opposite and below the mouth
of the Coyote Creek, so called, being a tribu-
tary of said River flowing through the Rancho
Santa Ana, in the County of Culua State
of California, to the extent of four hundred
inches measured under a four inch pressure,
for the purpose of irrigating the lands of
the Rancho Canada Langa, for the purpose
of supplying water for domestic and
manufacturing uses, and for any and all
other useful and beneficial purposes to which
the same may be contributed, and that it
is my desire to divert the water aforesaid
from its natural channel to said lands, and
for said purposes by a main way ditch, flume
dams, aqueducts, pipes & reservoirs. The ditch
to be from two to four feet in width at the
bottom and at least two feet in depth, and
said flumes to be thirty inches in width and
thirty, inches in depth - and the reservoirs to
be at most four hundred feet apart, and
six feet deep.
